Our membership as of March 31, 2006 was 1134, up from 946 the year prior. This represents a 19 percent increase that helps in achieving our commitment of making CACCN viable through membership fees and not dependant on

the Dynamics Conferences making a profit.

CNA Critical Care Certification

Adult Certification

The CACCN Board of Directors would like to congratulate all members who have certified or recertified in our specialty. This year at Dynamics in Ottawa, CACCN awarded 2 awards for adult certification and 3 awards for adult recertification. The winners of this year's award were Benoit Thibideau from Nova Scotia, Carolina Ross from Ontario, Samantha Taylor from Alberta, France Goudreau from Edmonton, and Susan Kean from Edmonton. The names of all members who certified and recertified were published in Dynamics:

The Official Journal of CACCN. April 1, 2006 was the date for writing this year's exam and we wish all candidates success. The Board of Directors would like to encourage our members to consider becoming certified in critical care as a personal accomplishment and a standard of excellence.

Pediatric Certification

Last year, 2005, was the third year for writing the Pediatric Critical Care Certification exam. Congratulations to all who have written. There were twelve nurses who attained certification in this specialty and three who were re-

certified in 2005. These numbers are reflective of those who gave permission to CNA to share their names. The winner of the Paediatric Certification Award was Cecilia St. George-Hyslop from Ontario.

Since the first administration of the Critical Care Pediatrics Nursing Examination, sixty one nurses have successfully completed the certification process. In the fall of 2005, two teleconferences were held and the examination committee reviewed and verified the content validity of the exam. The exam will continue to be reviewed and validated, or revised, as deemed necessary.

Research

The CACCN-Research Committee worked to facilitate the conduct and visualization of critical care nursing research.

The Research Committee consists of Wendy Fallis (Manitoba), Martha MacKay (BC), Sabrina Martin (Ontario) and is chaired by Asha Pereira, CACCN Vice President.

The CACCN Research Grant (\$1000) was awarded to Teddie Tanguay from Alberta.

Publications

Dynamics-The Official Journal of the CACCN is the only peer-reviewed critical care journal in Canada. We publish four issues annually, which are distributed to approximately 1000 subscribers. The journal is also listed in three library indexes and we have partnered with EBSCO publishing to list some of our articles on-line.

The summer issue of Dynamics is reserved for publishing abstracts that have been accepted for presentation at our fall conference, also called Dynamics. We continue to receive a lot of positive feedback from conference delegates and the membership-at-large who report that this initiative is helpful in keeping them in touch with current and new practices in critical care.

The Dynamics Journal continues to host a column offered by the Institute for Safe Medi-

cation Practices Canada (ISMP Canada). Together we are providing patient safety information on an ongoing basis. ISMP also posts these articles on their ISMP website, and references the article to our Journal. In addition, they provide a link to the CACCN website. We hope to continue this partnership and appreciate the continued support of ISMP Canada as we work toward the goal of continued improvements in patient safety.

Paula Price, our Clinical Editor, continues to do an outstanding job in effectively leading the Editorial Review Board, consisting of Debbie Fraser Askin (Manitoba), Janice Beitel (Ontario), Kathleen Graham (Ontario), Martha Mackay (BC), Franco Carnevale (PQ) and Judy Rashotte (Ontario). Joy Kramarich (Ontario) recently resigned after several years on the Editorial Review Board and we thank her for all

her valuable contributions to our Journal. The Publications Chair for 2005-2006 is Asha Pereira---CACCN Vice President.

CACCN is extremely fortunate to have the commitment of Pappin Communications of Pembroke, Ontario. Bruce, CB and Heather have continued to provide tremendous support to us.

We are especially proud of the publication of our newest Position Statement, "Family Presence During Resuscitation" that was authored by Grace MacConnell, a member of our Board of Directors. The Position Statement was launched at Dynamics in Ottawa and tied nicely to the keynote address by Cathie Guzzetta. Congratulations to Grace and thank you to those who provided input into this position statement.

The CACCN is a non-profit, specialty organization dedicated to maintaining and enhancing the quality of care provided to critically ill clients and their families. CACCN serves its membership, the public and the critical care nursing community by meeting the professional and educational needs of critical care nurses. These needs are met by developing and implementing standards of critical care nursing practice, providing educational opportunities, providing opportunities for networking, identifying and addressing political and professional issues, and finally by collaborating with other professional organizations.

A Brief History of CACCN

The National Society of Critical Care Nurses (NSCCN) based in Toronto, a chapter of the American Association of Critical Care Nurses (AACN), was established in 1975. On February 27, 1979, a group known as the Niagara Association of Critical Care Nurses (NACCN) was formed; the NACCN changed its name in 1981 to the Canadian Association of Critical Care Nurses (CACCN). In 1983, both the NSCCN and CACCN existed as separate associations. The two groups merged as the Canadian Association of Critical Care Nurses (CACCN), adopting the logo of the NSCCN, and became incorporated in February 1985. During that first year, a Co-President structure existed consisting of the Presidents of the NSCCN and original CACCN. While the membership began with a heavy base in Ontario, national representation took off with the merger of a strong Manitoba critical care group and the introduction of additional chapters across the country.
